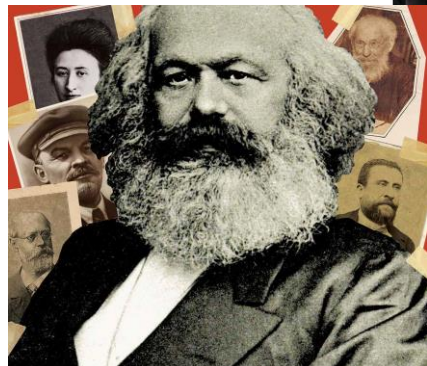

Paper 1: *Education with Theory and Methods* (2 hour written exam)

Education: 50 marks

Some short answer and extended writing. Investigate how the education system operates and its impact on different social groups.

Methods in Context: 20 marks

Extended writing. Learn how sociologists conduct research and analyse data in an educational setting.

Students will engage in theoretical debate while encouraging an active involvement with the research process.

Theory and Methods: 10 marks

Extended writing.

Paper 2: *Topics in Sociology* (2 hour written exam)

Families and Households: 40 marks

Extended writing. Explore changing family structures, roles, and relationships.

Media: 40 marks

Extended writing. Analyse the role of the media in society, including media ownership, representation, and the impact of digital communication.

Paper 3: *Crime and Deviance with Theory and Methods* (2 hour written exam)

Crime and Deviance: 50 marks

Some short answer and extended writing. Students will look at crime, deviance, social distribution, globalisation, and crime control.

Theory and Methods: 30 marks

Extended writing.
